A new Global Animal Welfare Assurance Scheme to improve the lives of farmed animals launched on World Animal Day (4 October). The initiative - led by The University of Bristol - aims to share knowledge and best practice with farmers and food businesses to increase the proportion of animals farmed to high welfare standards.

The alliance - comprised of RSPCA Assured, the Soil Association, Beter Leven (Netherlands), Global Animal Partnership (USA) and SPCA Blue Tick (New Zealand) - will help businesses to source products from animals that have been reared to high welfare standards and had a better life. The alliance can also help ensure the validity of welfare claims and pledges made by businesses.
